Annual festival to commemorate life and legacy of storyteller

The 12th Peadar Joe Haughey takes place at An Creagan Visitor Centre and other venues, between today (Wednesday, September 26) and Sunday, October 7. This Irish language and culture festival commemorates the life and legacy of Peadar Joe Haughey, a storyteller and one of the last native Irish speakers in the Tyrone Gaeltacht.

For the past 11 years, this festival has been organised by Peadar Joe's grandson Francis Clarke and his wife Mary. For the past number of years Francis has been supported by An Creagan Visitor Centre, Pobal ar a'n Iúil (Omagh branch of Conradh na Gaeilge), and Fermanagh and Omagh District Council. The events will take place at Peadar Joe's homestead, at An Creagan Visitor Centre and also at Main Street, Omagh.

The festival begins tonight with a new addition to this year's line-up, a Pop-up Gaeltacht event at Sean Ógs bar, Main Street Omagh, for learners and fluent speakers of Irish alike. The Pop-up Gaeltacht event began as a monthly get-together for Irish speakers in Dublin, in November 2016 and since then, the pop-up Gaeltacht has spread, with events being held in Perth, Dubai, Vancouver, New York and even La Paz in Bolivia.

"This is about asking people to look deep inside themselves and at their own relationship with the language; not as a school subject or as something you hated," said Peadar Ó Caomhánaigh, co-founder of the Pop-up Gaeltacht along with Osgur Ó Ciardha. This is the first Pop-up Gaeltacht event in the Omagh area, and takes place at 9pm at Sean Ógs bar at Main Street, Omagh.

The next event is a talk on 'The Role of the Harp

in Gaelic Society' by PhD student and Irish speaker Lauren O'Neill held at Peadar Joe's homestead on Thursday at 7.30pm.

The ever popular Oíche Ghaeltachta (Gaeltacht Singing Night), takes place as usual on Friday night, September 28. The night will begin with a singing workshop from 7.30pm, led by Sean-nós competition winner and Donegal native Máire Ní Choilm. The night will continue with Sean-Nós singers from different Gaeltacht areas. The Gaeltacht singing night is always one of the highlights of the festival, and is attended each year by singers from all over Ireland.

Saturday will see the return of the popular one day intensive Irish language course from 10am to 3pm in An Creagan, as well as a rang saibhreas for fluent Irish speakers who wish to add to their language. Following the classes on Saturday will be a presentation of the Francie Mac Annaidh Award to one adult learner who has excelled in their efforts to learn Irish in the past year. An open seisiún ceoil will be held in Paedar Joe's homestead on Saturday night beginning at 8pm.

On Sunday, Pobal ar a'n Iúil will be running a family day in collaboration with Glór na nGael at An Creagan from 12 noon to 3pm, for Irish speaking families. Activities will include art, games, facepainting and much more. The festival will close in a manner that Peadar Joe would surely be happy with - a storytelling session with several talented storytellers taking part. 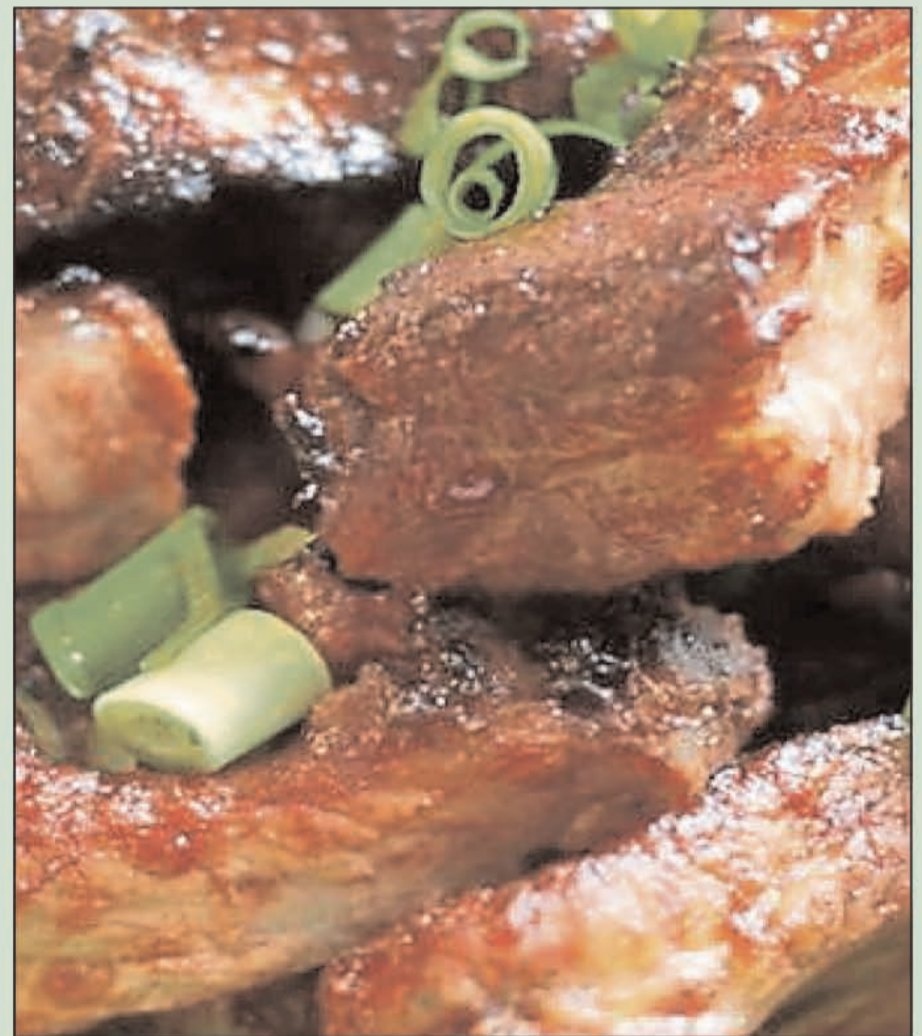

Chinese style ribs



IN this week's healthy eating column, Sharron McCormick - who has just launched her new recipe book - brings readers her take on Chinese style ribs.

Ingredients

- Pork Steaks, fat removed and cut in half lengthways
- One teaspoon of 'Lazy Garlic'
- One tablespoon of soy sauce
- One tablespoon of balsamic vinegar
- One tablespoon of granulated sweetener
- One tablespoon of tomato puree

Method

1: Mix the garlic, soy sauce, balsamic vinegar, sweetener and tomato puree

together in a dish and add the pork steaks.

2: Mix well to ensure they are thoroughly covered.

3: You can leave to marinade in the fridge for an hour or two or overnight or if you can't wait they will still be just as delicious if you cook them straight away.

4: Cook in a preheated oven at 175 for approximately 25 minutes until browned and cooked through.

Tip: If you like a more char-grilled effect you can also pop them under the grill and they are also excellent on a barbecue.

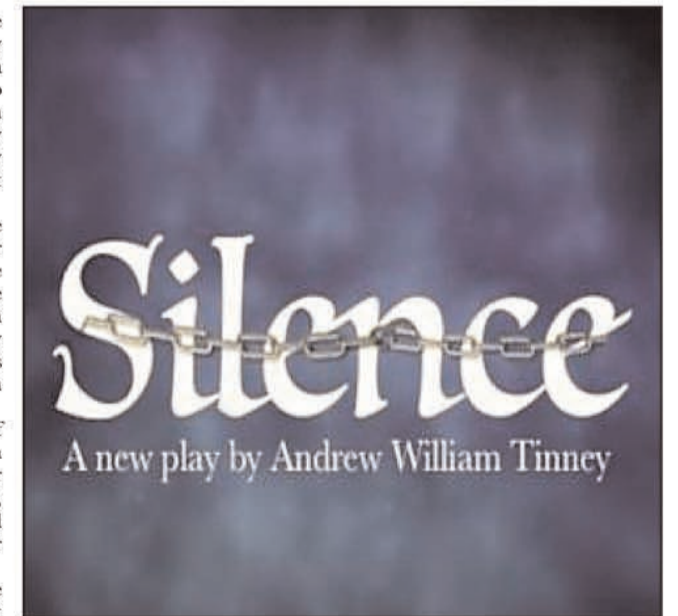

Cathal captures 'our beautiful, magical part of the world'

NEWRY Library is currently showcasing the fascinating work of Killeavy artist Cathal McDonnell, and a dander in off Hill Street to see it is highly recommended.

These pieces of art, you see, are not the run of the mill paintings you might expect.

Cathal's pieces on display are what are called "textured digital artworks" and are the culmination of eight years of research and development by this vastly experienced graphic designer.

"I use old and new technology to produce works with colour and texture," explained Cathal.

"I paint using a tablet and stylus with specialist software. I print with a very modern dye sublimation process, then hand-glaze and texture using techniques from the Dutch masters using modern acrylic polymers.

"The framed pieces on display are artworks in their own right. Some of the pieces explore virtual and augmented reality through your smartphone.

"In order to enjoy the immersive experience completely, I recommend people download and install the free apps, "ArtBeamer" and "Artivive".

Cathal returned to live in Newry four years ago, having lived and worked in New York, London and Amsterdam.

After leaving Art College, he began his career in the graphic design business by painting children's bedroom

murals.

He has also produced hand painted signage and spent a lot of time "coach-lining" horse drawn carriages and buggies.

From these experiences he developed wall textures with paint using rag-rolling, graining and stippling techniques. The work took him all over Europe when Irish pubs were a new concept.

His exhibition in Newry Library is, however, a completely new departure for Cathal, and is a precursor to him launching McDonnellArt.com, which will offer a whole range of paintings.

He outlined how, latterly, this opportunity came about.

"We returned to Belfast in 2005 where I continued to work in graphic design," said Cathal.

"At that point most of my business was still in New York (God bless the internet!) and I still have some regular clients in New York".

Ever on the move, and always learning, Cathal then moved into 3D CAD (computer-aided design) design, mostly to do renders for new housing developments and interiors of bars and restaurants.

This type of work disappeared with the financial crash in 2008. He then set his skills towards web design, with social media following quickly.

"Since then I have developed websites and E-Commerce for numerous businesses," he continued.

"I have developed social media presence and advertising campaigns for lots of diverse clients.

"Over the past eight years I have been trying to find a way to combine

my digital and practical skill bases, which has led to this exhibition.

"I have been selling pieces to a number of regular clients. I have been perfecting techniques and experimenting with different media to the point where I feel I am ready to go to market".

On his return to this part of the world, clearly a re-invigorating experience, Cathal added: "I fell in love with the whole area again. Perhaps it was being away for so long that when I returned I could see the whole landscape with fresh eyes.

"We live in a beautiful, magical part of the world. I can regularly be found driving around before dawn looking for a sunrise to capture, or wandering the shores of Carlingford Lough trying to get 'that' shot".

Shane stars in Verdi opera

WARRENPOINT man Shane McCormick will be part of the cast of the Giuseppe Verdi opera Rigoletto when it comes to the Grand Opera House on September 30.

One of the world's best loved operas, featuring such well known tunes as Donna è Mobile and Caro Nome, this production from NI Opera is being staged in co-operation with the Opera Nacional de Chile.

Multi-award winning Verdi baritone, Sebastian Catana, making his UK debut, stars as Rigoletto, while Cardiff Singer of the World Nadine Koutcher is Gilda and Davide Giusti, winner at Placido Domingo's Operalia World Opera Competition 2017, is the Duke of Mantua.

Twenty-three-year-old Shane is a member of the chorus and spoke to the Democrat about his excitement at the upcoming production.

"I am absolutely looking forward to it," said Shane. "It's a great cast and a very exciting venture with our new artistic director Walter Sutcliffe. So it's a really great opportunity."

"There are some songs in Rigoletto that people hear all the time. People always say to me: 'What is this opera about? I've never heard anything about it.'"

"But through advertisements on TV and TV shows, people know all of the opera songs. So they will be able to go and listen to something and say: 'Oh yeah I do know that song,' and it will probably have been in an insurance ad or something. So the songs are actually really recognisable from this opera."

Shane has no family connections to

opera, but at such a tender age, he has already achieved so much, from graduating from the London College of Music in 2017 with a First Class Honours degree in Music Performance, studying under the tutelage of internationally renowned tenor Anthony Roden, to singing with the Irish choral ensemble Anúna touring Asia and Europe for several months. It was during a production of The

Flying Dutchman with Northern Ireland Opera in 2013 - his first engagement as a professional singer - that Shane decided that a career as an opera singer was for him. He was just 17. He has not regretted that decision for a single moment.

"I absolutely love what I do, and feel very privileged to have the opportunity to do something that I love," said Shane.

"But it's very challenging at times as well. There are such a huge deal of things to remember.

"Not only the melody to the songs, the words to the songs, but also when you're singing in a foreign language - it's remembering whilst you're singing in Italian, there is also the English translation running in the back of your head because you need to know exactly what you're actually singing.

"There's also the choreography, and where you're supposed to be standing on stage, to what's happening at this moment, and what that person's saying. You have to be in control of absolutely everything and understand absolutely everything that's happening."

If you are thinking about going to see this production, but are unsure, then perhaps this endorsement from Walter Sutcliffe will sway you.

"Rigoletto is one of the wonders of the world. Forget Wagner," he said.

"Forget the Pyramids. This is the piece that takes our potential for darkness, negativity, self-absorption and blind idiocy and immerses it in a sound world that pushes our deepest emotional buttons.

"It throws us down a tunnel to give us one of the purest experiences of the power of musical drama".

Remote Control

AS I have noted before in this column, I think Jamie Oliver gets a lot of unfair press.

And, aside from sheer jealousy and resentment at his outstanding success, I have never understood why.

From relatively humble beginnings, the Essex man has, through graft and talent become one of the most recognisable TV chefs around. To boot, he appears to be a grounded family man who does not take himself too seriously.

Taking the health of the UK seriously has, however, opened him up to widespread opprobrium. The tone of this has been: 'Who does he think he is, telling us we are too fat and that we need to eat better, so that we will feel better, live longer, and take the strain off a beleaguered National Health Service?'

He has also been lambasted for how he looks and how he talks - personal criticism which says more about those dishing it out than it does Oliver.

Anyway, he has a new show on the go: Jamie Cooks Italy, and it's great, in a sexy, romantic, coffee table bookish kind of a way.

Many people will hate it. And that is both no surprise (it is Oliver after all) and totally understandable.

The series sets out to meet the masters of Italian cooking - the grandmothers, hear their ancient and trusted recipes and then try to rustle them up alongside his old buddy and Italian chef Gennaro Contaldo.

Without even seeing this show, you will know how it goes. Jamie meets the grannies (or nonnas as they are in Italian), they love him and he adores them, the two chaps nervously cook the dish hoping they do the recipe justice and then the little old lady gives her (inevitable) seal of approval.

And all the while, in the background, there is impossibly beautiful Italy. And Vespas, Fiat 500s, espressos, and casually stylish, but gorgeous Italians.

There is much cliché, and I really don't care. Oliver fairly bursts with enthusiasm, has great on screen rapport with Contaldo, and most importantly of all - the recipes he chooses to follow, like his own, are, as always, accessible, unfussy and superbly carried off.

FILM REVIEW: MILE 22 **STARRING:** Mark Wahlberg, Iko Uwais **DIRECTED BY:** Peter Berg

Wahlberg's B-movie is choppily directed



MARK Wahlberg once again reunites with director Peter Berg for this violent B-movie about a frenetic counter-terrorism operation.

Remarkably, this is their fourth film together in less than five years in what has been a relatively solid partnership, though the returns here are more diminishing than ever. It's a film well suited to the current climate developing in today's global politics, though in this case, that's not exactly a good thing.

Both star and director have shown they are more than capable of delivering interesting work in the past but if it is anything to go by; cynical, gory, and incoherent boilerplate offerings like this are not something they consider to be beneath them.

Jimmy Silva (Wahlberg), a hot-tempered black ops agent, heads a strike force stationed at a US embassy in an unnamed Southeast Asian country.

Li Noor (Iko Uwais) a mysterious Indonesian police officer hands himself into the embassy, claiming to have vital information. He informs the officials that he knows the location of several batches of caesium, a highly toxic substance that could potentially be used by terrorists to kill thousands.

He has with him a disk containing information on the caesium's whereabouts and will only tell them the code to unlock the disk if they grant him asylum in the US.

The embassy reluctantly goes along with the plan, instructing Silva and his team to escort Noor through the city's streets to the airport. Supervising the operation from a secret base, using a drone's eye view, is a man called Bishop (John Malkovich, sporting an inexplicable hairpiece). The team's journey to the airport quickly goes awry, as they are set upon by hordes of Indonesian soldiers, armed with bombs and machine guns.

As the bullets fly and the body count increases, Silva and his subordinates must race to get Noor to the airport, with the fate of countless lives in their hands.

Berg is a bit of a Jekyll and Hyde director. On one hand he has made, thoughtful acclaimed dramas like *Friday Night Lights* and *Patriots Day*. He has also displayed proclivities reminiscent of his friend Michael Bay in the likes of *Hancock* and *Battleship*. His latest effort certainly falls into the latter camp and

is worse for it. Typical of the kind of disposable action fare Hollywood often dumps between the summer and Christmas markets (see *Resident Evil*, *The Hitman's Bodyguard*) *Mile 22* is a 90 minute slog of numbing violence, stupid, jingoistic dialogue, poor performances and barely intelligible storytelling.

Everything feels nasty and perfunctory, from the cheesy opening credits to the humdrum, reactionary message. Wahlberg has proven before he can actually act but here he borders on obnoxious self-parody.

His character has an annoying tick of snapping a wristband to settle his nerves, which doesn't seem to stop him from going on self-satisfied diatribes about militarism and geo-politics. Malkovich meanwhile seemingly just wants to pick up the cheque.

Only Uwais and Lauren Cohen as Silva's second-in-command emerge with their reputations unscathed.

Quite apart from its general phoned-in aesthetic, *Mile 22* is a film hampered by bad direction and violence rarely seen outside of horror movies. Despite having martial arts star Uwais's inestimable skills at his disposal, Berg makes the decision of filming the actor's big fight sequence so that you can barely tell what's happening.

Frantic shaky cam cinematography and choppy editing hampers the whole scene so that instead of a set-piece similar to a classic Hong Kong actioner, we are left confused by lazy craftsmanship.

These problems also plague much of the other, street-level action that takes up most of the runtime. The same can be said of the storytelling, featuring jarring plot twists that barely make any sense and leave far too much unexplained. The ending is laughably abrupt, with numerous questions left unanswered.

Coupled with the excessive blood-letting, with Berg indulging in numerous disturbing details (such as suicides and a drone operator laughing gleefully after taking down an enemy), it all adds up to a wholly unsatisfying experience.

A choppily directed, disjointed mess, *Mile 22* finds director and star scraping the bottom of the action barrel.

IN the rough and tumble of a problematic world it is seriously unfashionable to think gentle thoughts and to give consideration to the writing and musings of gentle people.

It is therefore not a bad thing to take a moment out and to shine a light on such matters, to analyse the words of great people whose philosophies, if acted upon, would make the world a better place, where the lion could indeed lie down with the lamb.

Such a man was Francis. He was a man of the town of Assisi in Italy. He is in Dublin today in the heart and the spirit of Brother Kevin in the Franciscan Capuchin Centre for the needy, so many of them homeless.

The Francis Prayer is interesting.

"Lord, make me an instrument of your peace...." It's got a good ring to it, straight out of the story book of life, of good life, but not easy to implement. It is I suggest basic to our humanity that we fight, break from peace, to achieve what we need for ourselves and those we love. To fight is seen to be the way forward, to drive evil away, to deliver well-being for the poor and needy; it can be an option when all else fails and we can,

time and time again, make the excuses for not being an instrument of peace. It is worth discussing no doubt. Had Francis and Ghandi the better take on it?

"Where there is hatred let me sow love...." Like the first line of the Franciscan prayer it is challenging. To do such a thing is to answer a call to action. It goes beyond turning the other cheek. The notion is that we go on the offensive, become pro-active, take a chance on doing the more difficult thing and taking the moment

to step back and see what happens, see how the world can be better. In a world that lacks love, I suggest it is worth taking a chance and going through life planting seeds of love.

And it is happening already....efforts for the homeless people, fund-raising for Little Ellen, the Kevin Bell Trust, PIPS, my people in Africa, the schools, the hope for a better future, the love held in a warm and gentle smile.

Yes we are on the journey. Let the sowing continue.

"Where there is doubt, faith..." doubt about what, faith in what? The prayer draws us into the realm of religion and I have difficulty here. One person's religion is another's right to hate and to kill. So, I suggest, the requirement is to look beyond religion and to find the face and the heart of God.

It is my observation that God is infinitely greater and infinitely more important than the stories of the Bible, narratives that are finite; a beginning, a middle and an end.

We are right to doubt and to allow doubt to drive us forward on the journey to discover the truth about who we are and where we are going.

An acceptance of our transient state is a good starting point.

Please may I suggest that you do not take my analysis but that you give yourself the job of finding out for yourself.

Try writing your own prayers, much better, I suggest, than reading the prayer of Francis.

I recall the prayer the old lady told me about: "I know that Jesus loves me." It was her prayer, speaking to

herself, reminding herself, and, at times, telling a neighbour, "God loves you".

I first heard that line first from the Dominican, Father Joseph Ralph. In his early days in Newry it might have been Joseph's mantra, "God Loves You".

I went for it then and hold onto it now.

Finally for now I take you back fifty years and my time of meeting Alex Watson, the Presbyterian Minister of Harmony Heights church outside Lisburn.

Every time you met Alex he would greet you, "God bless you Brother", accompanied by the warmest handshake.

You always felt better leaving Alex than when you arrived.

On the journey thus far I have had the privilege of knowing many Alex Watson's.... Joe Ralph, John Kearney, Donall O' Cathain of my African Schools' Project, Paulina our first Headmistress, Sr. Mary Taylor, Charlie Byrne.

Now, so many years later, I am, at last, able to be an Alex Watson, for me and for others.

Peter, along with his late brother Francie,

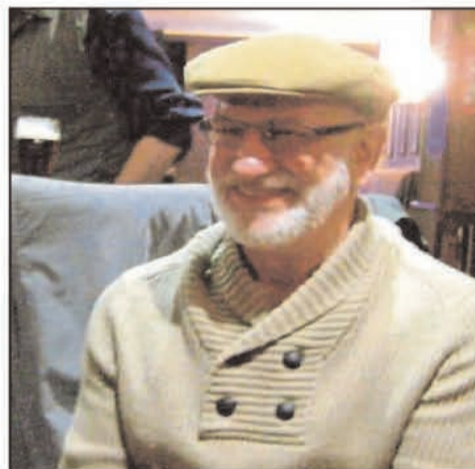
were founding members of an Ciorcal Comhra Ard Macha in 2006.

Mel McMahon was born in Lurgan in 1968. His work has appeared widely in journals and anthologies and has been broadcast on BBC Radio Ulster. Mel has been short-listed for several literary prizes and was a prize-winner in the PSNI Poetry Competition (2015). His work has been nominated twice for the Forward Prize for best individual poem and his first book of poems, Out of Breath, was published by Summer Palace Press in 2016.

He is currently Head of English at the Abbey Grammar School, Newry. His second book of poems, Beneath Our Feet, published in 2018, is an exploration of the last few years of war poet, Wilfred Owen's short life.

Mel will be reading his poetry in Ors, France, as part of events to mark the centenary of Wilfred Owen's death. Before leaving for France, Mel agreed to join the City Chapter for this event and spoke about reading in Armagh, saying, "I'm delighted to be part of events to mark National Poetry Day in Armagh. Poetry can provide opportunities for life, awareness and insight so it's great to see a special day being set aside for its promotion."
