

Words of Newry Chamber of Commerce and Trade President Julie Gibbons in her address to guests who gathered in the Canal Court Hotel in Newry for the annual President's Banquet.

The theme of the event was 'City of Celebration' as 2022 marked the 20th Anniversary of Newry attaining City Status.

The President told the audience:

"We are now the civic and business leaders who must roll up our sleeves, get stuck in and really ensure that we rise to the challenge, forge ahead and ensure that no momentum is lost as we fix our vision on the next 20 years and beyond.

"We deserve to finally grow into the city we always knew we could be, worthy of our status, reclaiming our title as a city of merchants and "Over the past year many people have asked me about WHY I took on the Presidency of Newry Chamber, and in the early days, I may well have asked myself the same question!

The truth is, that one of the reasons I became involved in the Chamber and eventually accepted the nomination to become VP and now President, was because a previous, much loved, dearly and recently departed Chamber Vice President badgered me into it!

"This year alone we have met NI Economy and Finance Ministers, UK Government EVER-CHANGING cabinet Ministers, MLAs and MPs, most NI political Party Leaders, Dail Eireann TDs, Foreign Ambassadors and Senior Whitehall officials from the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy to voice our members' concerns and to try influence decision making and tangible actions.

"We are also part of the One Voice Group which is a collective consisting of 13 Chambers of Commerce across NI and Retail

consisting of 13 Chambers of Commerce across NI and Retail NI, Hospitality Ulster and the NI Takeaways Association. This week we went to Stormont to lobby for a rates holiday for sectors most affected by the cost of living and energy crises and we are joint signatories to a paper laying out suggested actions to both the NI Executive and Westminster to alleviate current economic headwinds facing our members.

But we have always been a City of determination, resilience and grit. In fact, if we can see past the current challenges, and it is difficult, there is much to be to optimistic about in the

Firstly, Newry Mourne and Down's inclusion in the £1 billion Belfast Region City Deal is going to deliver a bespoke package of funding to Newry, Mourne and Down District helping the development of long awaited and hard fought for infrastructure projects such as the Southern Relief Road and regeneration of the city centre including public realm, theatre, conference and innovation space and the Mourne Mountain Gateway. The Albert Basin Park will finally deliver a City Centre Park with funding of £16.2mn from the Complimentary Fund, and this is on track to be out to tender in quarter 2 next year.

These projects are finally mobilising a major infrastructural overhaul of our almost 900 year-old city and will include new grade A offices in the city, new health facilities, an enhanced night-time economy with new conferencing and event space and a range of other projects which will all boost investor confidence and appetite to invest more in this area, out of which jobs and further opportunities will come. The ambition dresses the audience.

is that businesses scaling up or locating here will create opportunities for talent who will choose to stay here and also relocate to this area and that the infrastructure, the housing, the health care and the education will meet growing de-

We already have the lifestyle in this our beloved Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty – and these tourism initiatives, estimated to attract at least half a million domestic and international tourists a year, together with projects such as the Narrow Water Bridge will make this area more accessible and attractive to visitors, talent and investors.

Across the Belfast City Deal region, 20,000 jobs will be generated as it is delivered over the next 10 years accelerating economic growth for the region in an inclusive and sustainable way. The council has also secured funding from the Shared Island Fund to kick start 6 projects locally, and have a number of bids applied for through the Levelling Up Fund and is exploring Investment Zones and opportunities for this area through the Shared Prosperity Fund."

"See Newry City Charter at Newry and Mourne Museum"

In 2002, as part of Queen Elizabeth II's Golden Jubilee celebrations, the market town of Newry was granted City Status. The City Charter was presented by the Queen to Councillor Frank Feely, then the Deputy Chairman of the former Newry and Mourne District Council, in May

The themes for the artwork on the Charter, undertaken by Wendy Selby, represent Newry's pride in its long and diverse history. The border of the Charter consists of Irish Yew tree leaves, which represents the tradition of St. Patrick planting a Yew tree at a sandy stretch by the Clanrye River as a symbol of the Christian faith. Iubhair Cinn Tragh, the Irish name for Newry, translates to 'yew tree at the head of the strand'.

The seal depicting St. Patrick and the Yew Trees represents the Cistercian Abbey. Established in 12th century, the abbey became a significant stimulus to the development of Newry as a

settlement in the medieval period.

A castle built by Sir Nicholas Bagenal, a settler from Staffordshire and Marshall of the Army in Ireland, in the mid-16th century is also shown on the Charter and is the oldest known surviving building in Newry. It is now the location of the

St. Patrick's Church, and the Cathedral of St. Patrick and St. Colman are both illustrated on the City Charter. St. Patrick's Parish Church was originally built by Nicholas Bagenal c.1578 as the first purpose-built Protestant church in Ireland. The present church dates from the 18th and 19th centuries. The Cathedral was constructed in 1829 from local granite and was designed by architect,

The arms of the Earls of Kilmorey illustrate the long association of this family with the town of



Newry. The Needham family, which inherited the Bagenal estates in Newry and Mourne in 1712 and became Earls of Kilmorey in 1822, were responsible for much of the commercial growth and development of the town in the 18th and

The maritime history of Newry and the construction of the first summit level canal in the British Isles is symbolised on the Charter by a ship on the Canal at Merchant's Quay. It signifies the trade and commerce that it engendered.

One of the last projects undertaken by the Newry Town Commissioners before the introduction of the Urban District Council was the building of the Town Hall in 1893. The building, designed by William Batt, is built on a three-arched bridge over the Clanrye River.

The Newry City Charter can be seen in gallery three of the Museum. Entrance to the Museum is free of charge, with free car parking.






